VENUES

MADINGLEY HALL (SEMINAR VENUE)

Madingley Hall is a 16th-century country house set in seven acres of landscaped gardens; the hall was built by Sir John Hynde in 1543 and occupied as a residence by his descendants until the 1860s. Queen Victoria rented the Hall in 1860 for her son Edward (the future King Edward VII) to live in while he was an undergraduate at Cambridge University. The Hall has been owned by the University of Cambridge since 1948 and is currently the home of the Institute of Continuing Education.



CLARE COLLEGE (LECTURE VENUE)

Clare College (founded 1326), although the second oldest College in the University, it is one of the more progressive and informal. It spans the River Cam, running between the Old Schools (the administrative centre of the University) and the University Library. Clare is famous for its chapel choir and for its gardens on "the Backs" (the back of the colleges that overlook the River Cam).



PETERHOUSE COLLEGE (GALA DINNER VENUE)

Peterhouse is the oldest of the constituent colleges in the University of Cambridge. It was founded in 1284 by Hugo de Balsham, Bishop of Ely, on its current site close to the centre of the City. It is also the smallest college, housing an intellectual community of some 45 Fellows, 260 undergraduates and 110 graduate students.
