Katherine Chou, Head of Product for Healthcare in Google AI

Katherine Chou is the Head of Product for Healthcare in Google AI, developing products that apply AI to advance the practice of medicine & science. Katherine specializes in incubating products and establishing sustainable businesses for Google. She previously developed products within Google[x] Labs for Life Sciences (now Verily) and ran global teams to develop partner solutions and establish developer ecosystems for Mobile Payments, Mobile Ads, Mobile Search, GeoCommerce, and Android. She is also a Board member and Program Chair of Lewa Wildlife Conservancy, a fellow of the Zoological Society of London, and collaborates with other wildlife NGOs and the Cambridge Business Sustainability Programme in applying the Silicon Valley innovation mindset to new areas. She holds a double major in Computer Science and Economics at Stanford University and an M.S. in CS.



Louise Ellison, Head of Sustainability, Hammerson plc

Philippe Joubert, CEO, Earth on Board & Fellow, CISL.

Philippe Joubert is Founder and CEO of Earth on Board, an ecosystem of sustainability actors dedicated to informing and helping Boards to put sustainability at the centre of the company's strategy, achieving an Earth Competent Board. Joubert is also Trustee of Client Earth, Senior Advisor and Special Envoy Energy and Climate for WBCSD – World Business Council for Sustainable Development, Advisor for International Development of World Energy Council (WEC), Chairman of HRH The Prince of Wales's Corporate Leaders Group on Climate Change, Chair of the Advisory Board of the Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership and Fellow in this Institute. He is Advisor to several CEOs of leading global companies in the area of Sustainability and International Development. He serves as a member of the Sustainability Committee of the Board of Fibria, Board member for Nexans Foundation and Advisory Board Member of Nexans South America. He sits on the board of Voltaia, a developer in Renewable Energy, a listed Cie of the Mulliez family and is also a Non-Executive Director of ENEO, Electricity of Cameroun. Philippe was previously President of Alstom Power and Deputy Chief Executive Officer of the Alstom Group. Philippe is French and Brazilian, has been awarded the Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur and graduated from Ecole Supérieure des Sciences Economiques et Commerciales (ESSEC -76).



Tony Juniper CBE, Executive Director of Advocacy & Campaigns, WWF-UK & Fellow, CISL

Tony Juniper CBE is the Executive Director for Advocacy and Campaigns at WWF-UK, a Fellow with the University of Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership and President of the Wildlife Trusts. He is a Harmony Professor of Practice at the University of Wales Trinity St David and speaks and writes widely on conservation and sustainability themes. Until January 2018 he was an independent sustainability and environment advisor, including as Special Advisor with The Prince of Wales's International Sustainability Unit and a co-founder of sustainability consultancy group Robertsbridge. He is the author of many books, including the multi-award winning bestseller 'What has Nature ever done for us?' published in 2013. Tony began his career as an ornithologist, working with Birdlife International. From 1990 he worked at Friends of the Earth, initially leading the campaign for the tropical rainforests, and from 2003–2008 was the organisation's executive director. From 2000–2008 was Vice Chair of Friends of the Earth International. Tony was the first recipient of the Charles and Miriam Rothschild medal (2009) and was awarded honorary Doctor of Science degrees from the Universities of Bristol and Plymouth (2013). Tony's latest book, the Ladybird guide to climate change, co-authored with HRH The Prince of Wales and Emily Shuckburgh, was published in January 2017. In 2017 he was appointed a Commander of the British Empire (CBE). His most recent book, 'Rainforest', was published in April 2018.



Håkan Nordkvist, Head of Sustainable Innovation, IKEA Group

Currently Håkan Heads the Sustainability Innovation work at IKEA Group. His role is to identify, enable and build new sustainability related businesses that drive value for IKEA customers and IKEA. Håkan joined IKEA more than 20 years ago, and have had a variety of different senior positions in the company, mostly in supply chain, among others he has been on the advisory boards of Trading Greater China and Trading South Asia.



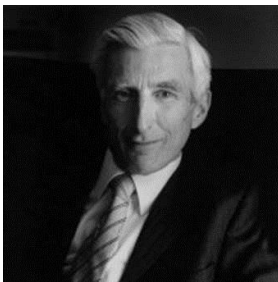
Prof Marc le Menestrel, Assistant Professor, University of Pompeu Fabra Barcelona & Senior Associate, CISL

Marc Le Menestrel is Senior Associate at the Cambridge Institute of Sustainability Leadership. Marc teaches and coaches senior executives and board directors on high level performance and leadership as well as the exercise of wise power in governance, sustainability, anti-corruption and risk management. Leading companies and academic institutions are using his expertise and innovative pedagogical approaches to inspire leaders, organizations and directors in search of both performance and meaning. As a decision scientist, Marc's research is focused on the theory of choice; the confluence of rational thinking and ethical values in decision making; and the use of mathematical theories of measurement to articulate the subjectivity of human behaviour. His work has been published in academic journals such as Psychological Science, The Journal of Mathematical Psychology; Theory and Decision; Discrete Mathematics; The European Journal of Operational Research; The Journal of Economics and Business Organizations; The Journal of Business Ethics; Ecological Economics; Business Ethics: A European Review. Marc Le Menestrel has been teaching the ethics of sustainability leadership at the Cambridge University Institute for Sustainability for more than a decade. He is a tenured professor at University Pompeu Fabra (Barcelona). As Visiting Professor for Corporate Governance and Sustainability at INSEAD, Singapore, he is affiliated with the INSEAD Corporate Governance Centre and the INSEAD Social Innovation Centre. He is a regular contributor to the Lisbon MBA and he also co-directs the African Directors Program, a joint collaboration between INSEAD and Stellenbosch University Business School. He is advisor to the World Economic Forum on its Partnering for Anti-Corruption Initiative.



Kate Raworth, Senior Associate, CISL, and Senior Visiting Research Associate, Environmental Change Institute, University of Oxford

Kate Raworth is an economist whose research focuses on the unique social and ecological challenges of the twenty-first century. She teaches at Oxford University's Environmental Change Institute, where she is a Senior Visiting Research Associate, and she is a Senior Associate of the Cambridge Institute for Sustainability Leadership. Over the last two decades Kate has worked as Senior Researcher at Oxfam, as a co-author of the UN's Human Development Report at the United Nations Development Programme, and as a Fellow of the Overseas Development Institute in the villages of Zanzibar. She has been named by The Guardian as one of the top ten tweeters on economic transformation.



Lord Martin Rees of Ludlow, Fellow Trinity College & Emeritus Professor of Cosmology and Astrophysics, The Institute of Astronomy

Martin Rees is a Fellow of Trinity College and Emeritus Professor of Cosmology and Astrophysics at the University of Cambridge. He holds the honorary title of Astronomer Royal and also Visiting Professor at Imperial College London and at Leicester University. After studying at the University of Cambridge, he held post-doctoral positions in the UK and the USA, before becoming a professor at Sussex University. In 1973, he became a fellow of King's College and Plumian Professor of Astronomy and Experimental Philosophy at Cambridge (continuing in the latter post until 1991) and served for ten years as director of Cambridge's Institute of Astronomy. From 1992 to 2003 he was a Royal Society Research Professor, and then from 2004 to 2012, Master of Trinity College. In 2005 he was appointed to the House of Lords, and he was President of the Royal Society for the period 2005-10. Martin is also one of the co-founders of The Cambridge Centre for the Study of Existential Risk (CSER).



David Sales, Director, First Ascent

David is an owning director of First Ascent Group, a global leadership development consultancy. He is also a director of Emergenetics UK, a global provider of neuroscience-based leadership and performance enhancement programmes. He also leads the training portfolio delivery at St Johns Innovation Centre, Cambridge and is Chairman of the Institute of Directors in East of England and sits on the IoD National Council. After graduating from Cambridge University David joined BT. After several successful years in UK and international sales, he took an MBA at Warwick University. In 1998, David was appointed CEO of BT's Teleconferencing business. In 2005, David acquired First Ascent, to follow his passion for leadership development. David also leads a wide range of bespoke leadership and culture development programmes for a significant number of organisations. His particular interest is our emerging knowledge about brain science and how this supports leaders in seeking to achieve great results. He mentors chief executives and directors across many sectors, including public sector, health, global multinationals, technology start-ups and sport. He is an acclaimed speaker on the emerging influence of neuroscience in leadership.



Dr Emily Shuckburgh OBE, Head of Polar Oceans, British Antarctic Survey & Fellow, CISL

Emily is a climate scientist and leads the Open Oceans research group at the British Antarctic Survey, which is focused on understanding the role of the polar oceans in the global climate system. She is also a fellow of Darwin College, a member of the Faculty of Mathematics, an associate of the Cambridge Centre for Climate Change Mitigation Research, an associate fellow of the Centre for Science and Policy, a member of the Cambridge Forum for Sustainability and the Environment, all at the University of Cambridge. In the past she has worked at École Normale Supérieure in Paris and at MIT. She is a fellow of the Royal Meteorological Society and Chair of their Climate Science Communications Group, a trustee of the Campaign for Science and Engineering and a member of the Scientific Steering Committee of the Isaac Newton Institute for Mathematical Sciences. She is a member of the Natural Environment Research Council's Strategic Program Advisory Group and has acted as a scientific advisor to the UK Government. Emily was awarded an OBE 'for services to Science and Public Communication of Science' in the Queen's Birthday Honours list in 2016.



Dimitri Zenghelis, Joint-Head Policy, Grantham Research Institute, London School of Economics

Dimitri joined the Grantham Research Institute on Climate Change and the Environment in April 2013 is responsible for producing, commissioning and communicating research on the economics of climate change policy. Previously, he headed the Stern Review Team at the Office of Climate Change, London, and was a senior economist on the Stern Review on the Economics of Climate Change, commissioned by the then Chancellor Gordon Brown. Before working on climate change, Dimitri was Head of Economic Forecasting at HM Treasury. Dimitri was a Senior Economic Advisor to Cisco from 2008-2013. From 2007 to 2008, he was Head of the Stern Review Team. Prior to this, Dimitri was Senior Economist of the Stern Review Team at HM Treasury and Head of Economic Forecasting at HM Treasury. His research interests include the macroeconomic aspects of climate change and the design of policy regimes for tackling harmful climate change.
